Rope is one of the most useful inventions in the history of mankind. It is believed that prehistoric humans used vines, grasses and even leather to fashion short ropes, but it was the Egyptians in 3500 BC who determined that twisting fibers together and forming a small bundle made a rope stronger, more durable and efficient. Simply using one strand provided virtually no strength, two strands added more, but three strands twisted together in different directions called plaiting or braiding, proved to be much more than three times stronger than the single, original strand.

This braided cord of three strands is a metaphor for the organization of Good Works.

Good Works is comprised of three essential elements namely those who serve and partner with us, our homeowners, and Father God. The three are inextricably intertwined, like a cord of three strands. The Bible tells us in Ecclesiastes 4:12, that "a cord of three strands is not easily broken." It is a symbol that is both spiritually and physically meaningful. Let's take a deeper look at each strand.

The Partner strand is comprised of thousands of fibers representing our staff, volunteers, donors, suppliers, corporate and church partners. By sheer numbers alone, this is a strong strand. Each fiber, is a person or group of people who see Good Works mission as important to their community, and often their faith. Eyes and hearts are opened as people from different walks of life work together. We believe that everyone benefits when people from different

racess, cultures, and backgrounds join together in a common purpose – to repair homes and restore hope.

The Homeowner strand is comprised of men, women and children who are struggling with poverty. It is a strand intertwined with both strong and fragile fibers made up of people who have been touched by adversity, often due to circumstances that are outside of their control. It is a strand often maligned and marginalized by society. Yet it is extravagantly rich in diversity, personality and potential. Within the fibers of this strand we see lives transformed in miraculous ways.

The third strand is none other than the God of our universe. The Author and Creator of all things. This strand represents the character of God. A strand made up of Father, Son and Spirit. Its fibers include absolute holiness, perfect wisdom, irrefutable truth and unconditional love. It is eternal and unchanging. This strand is perfect and infinitely strong. It is the strand that binds the other two and is in fact the One that holds the entire universe together.

If that isn't amazing enough, consider how the braids wrap around each other. How the Partners and the Homeowners and God are in direct contact with each other, spiral after spiral, in a continuum that has existed for over thirty years. We rely on each other. We need each other. We are stronger when we pull together. Good Works is a ministry where everyone is welcome. It is a place where volunteers can help their neighbors and together build stronger communities.

It is a place where religion is trumped by relationship with God and with each other. It is a place where faith and works combine. It is truly a cord of three strands and Lord willing, it will never be broken.

At the invitation of a friend, Frank Stearns participated in his first Good Works workday back in 2016. Unfortunately, he wasn't physically able to perform the repairs due to chronic health problems and fatigue resulting from a difficult battle with Lyme disease in 2014. Frank retired in 2018 after 35 years of clinical research in the biopharmaceutical industry and was looking for another way to make a positive social impact.

When Good Works launched its Genesis Project aimed at being a good environmental steward, Frank reengaged. "Recycling e-waste is win-win-win," says Frank, "It is good for the environment, for Good Works and for me." E-Waste includes used Inkjet cartridges, videogames, cell phones, tablets and

other small electronics. Frank set up a collection bin at his church and from time to time he is offered the opportunity to tell the congregation about his project. "Give me your garbage!" he shares from the pulpit. Every other month, Frank brings his collection of e-waste to Good Works for processing.

Good Works has partnered with Planet Green Recycling (www.planetgreenrecycle.com) to raise funds for making the homes of low-income families more energy efficient. "It is a great way to raise money for a good cause," says Frank "and so easy for people to do."

"This venture has been a positive addition to my work week," exclaimed Bob, "I look forward to more opportunities to work with students in the future."
